## The Life-Changing Power of a Ramp



The word home evokes images of comfort and safety. Our homes should feel like a refuge. But imagine when your home is not entirely safe for you, or it is a challenge just to enter your house. That is the situation Carrie found herself in until Good Neighbors Home Repair was able to help her by providing and installing a ramp.

Carrie is a 37-year-old woman with spina bifida. When she was born, doctors told her mother, Pamela, that Carrie would never talk or walk. Carrie has defied all expectations. Before the COVID-19 pandemic, Carrie had been working as a receptionist for the daycare center at the Salvation Army. She also enjoyed volunteering her time with the kids there. Still, Carrie has lived a life that most people never would have dreamed for her.

Carrie had been using a walker to get around, but that became increasingly difficult over time. Eventually, using the walker to get into her house became impossible. Although the house had just four steps up to its entrance, they were quite steep. It reached a point where Carrie's leg would occasionally

lock as she mounted the steps, and she would fall into the house. That's when Carrie started crawling up the steps to be able to safely get into her home. Even in good weather crawling up the steps isn't a great solution, but with rain or snow, it's absolutely terrible. Pamela knew Carrie needed a ramp, and she reached out to Habitat for Humanity who had built



Everything was going smoothly until the COVID-19 pandemic disrupted the timeline. Good Neighbors had purchased several used ramps (at about half the cost of new ramps) from a supplier in New York, and the shipment was delayed due to the pandemic. This set back the installation of Carrie's ramp.

Fortunately, the ramps eventually made it out of New York and Carrie's ramp was installed in May. The ramp has restored safety to Carrie's home. Pamela reports that Carrie is very happy with it and said, "Mom, I like it." Carrie no longer has to worry about getting in and out of her house, and when the COVID-19 crisis has passed, Carrie will be able to return to her job at the Salvation Army. All of us at Good Neighbors are thankful for the generous support of foundations and individuals that enable us to repair homes and restore hope.







In the last 90 days I have had to learn new vocabulary words: social distancing, comorbidity, COVID-19, pandemic, self-quarantine, and N95 masks. We live in interesting times!

Having to stay home for so long has reminded me of the importance of a home that is warm, safe, dry, and healthy. I'm sure I had taken these necessities for granted. Now, the mission of Good Neighbors seems even more clear.
